MAUNDY THURSDAY: LOVE ONE ANOTHER AS I HAVE LOVED YOU

As we enter the Lenten Season, beginning with Ash Wednesday and the imposition of ashes, just around the corner is Maundy Thursday. Maundy Thursday is not a misspelling. The types of holy services during this time are considered among the most meaningful as well! It is the time that commemorates at least two things:

- 1. The Washing of Feet hospitality, welcome, and humility
- 2. The Last Supper the final gathering of Jesus' Disciples

Generally, these two celebrations follow the resurrection *after* Christ's Crucifixion. Keep in mind, however, actual dates vary. The Good News is that Jesus, and his miraculous works, have been celebrated century after century by many Churches.

WHAT DOES MAUNDY MEAN?

even at other special designated services.

On its own, the word *Maundy* means the **washing of feet**, especially for the poor and a sort of commemoration of Jesus washing His disciples' feet during the Upper Room devotion. In addition, recorded first around 1250–1300 ADE, the word *Maundy* comes from the Old French *mande*, in turn from Latin *mandātum*, which means "mandate or command." As you may have guessed, this Latin word is the source of the English meaning, *mandate*. It stands to reason, therefore, Christian Communities embrace it as a viable time as well as special ritual to celebrate.

In fact, the amazing part of this custom is that researchers and pastors believe it would be prodigious to have a foot washing on a regular basis, or perhaps even to lift up a ritual or sacrament each year. Think of it: groups like the Emmaus Walk already practice Maundy during training sessions. They often, too, **serve each other in love creatively** during Easter time celebration.

The specific mandate or command refers to the words Jesus inferred after washing the feet of his disciples during the Last Supper (that is, the last time he met with them before returning to the Father). In the New King James Version of the Gospel of John, chapter 13, verse 34, Jesus said: "A new commandment I give you that you love one another; even as I have loved you." The New commandment, in the Latin of the Vulgate is novum mandātum. It makes sense, then, some scholars therefore, attached it as a type of sacrament recommended during the Easter Season and

MORE SPECIFICALLY...

THE LAST SUPPER: LOVE ONE ANOTHER

Maundy Thursday, also known as *Holy Thursday and Sheer Thursday*, among other names is a Christian holy day that commemorates the *Washing of Feet and the last Supper*. These two celebrations lead us into Easter. *Maundy Thursday* tends to follow after Holy Wednesday (the imposition of the ashes as mentioned), and is followed immediately by a Good Friday, or in some traditions, a Holy Saturday, and then followed by Easter. Bottom line, this particular week might be busy but it is among the *holiest of times* for every Christian as well.

In terms of the Last Supper, Jesus washed his Disciples' feet as they shared their final meal together (before Jesus resurrected). The meaning of washing feet is layered:

- 1. It is said in the ancient world, guests that visited would be provided fresh water to *clean their feet after a dusty trip*. After all, most everyone wore sandals. Often, the host or servants would wash the feet of guests.
- 2. It was a *sign of welcome and care to guests*. In the ancient days, some cities were not as welcoming but Hebrew people, indeed, were. Review how Abraham, as a meaningful example, came to the care of his guests! (Genesis 18:4: Let a little water be brought, and then you may all wash your feet and rest under this tree). Imagine how dusty those trails were, too, and how refreshing cleaning one's feet could be! In today's culture, when we travel many hours, a refreshing shower (as part of freshening up) comforts us.
- 3. It is also an act of humility. That is, servants frequently washed the feet of guests. The son of God, as Christians believe, meant that Jesus was performing a lowly position duty! Christians have come to interpret Jesus' washing of feet as an illustration of a humble mission of service to God. The act has also come to symbolize the cleansing of sin from fellow Christians and so Jesus' new commandment was urging his disciples to show forgiveness to all as depicted in the painting of The Last Supper by Leonardo Da Vinci. It was this act that led to the shaping of the Eucharist Jesus Body (the Bread) and Jesus' Blood (salvation of humanity).

As Disciples, may we experience this glory of God's richest blessings during the Easter Season with our signs of hospitality, love and humility, and welcome to all.







Lenten signals



Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.

We observe Lent because it tells us to STOP and rest awhile — and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to LOOK inward for an honest self-examination, to look upward to see the cross of Jesus with healing and love, and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent because it tells us to LISTEN — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent.

What's in it for me?

Communion takes on new meaning for me when Jesus calls himself the bread of life. The day after feeding the 5,000, Jesus explains, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life" (John 6:54, NIV). Many people stop following him after that, finding the teaching too difficult. Maybe Jesus is challenging people who claim to be his disciples but are in it just for the miracles.

When I hear the Words of Institution, I ask myself if I'm a "What's in it for me?" follower. Do I expect Jesus to merely impress me with answered prayers? Or do I trust him completely and serve him wholeheartedly? Am I like Peter, who, when asked whether I'll leave too, replies, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (v. 68).



- Permanent markers (dark colors)
- Black construction paper
- White cardstock

RISE UP ANEW: SUNNY DAY CAMP

On a dark night in early December 2021, entirely out of season, tornadoes tore across eight states, killing more than 80 people and devastating many communities. Just eight months later, on a warm Saturday in July, two Disciples churches and several community organizations made sure that dozens of children impacted by those winter storms in western Kentucky spent time outside with friends and caregivers, reveling in a bright and sunny day.

As their churches were recovering from the storms, caring for their members and communities, and even hosting long-term recovery volunteers, pastors at First Christian Church of Madisonville and First Christian Church of Princeton dreamed of a way to connect with the region's youngest survivors—children from kindergarten to fifth grade who were affected by the tornadoes.

How could they care for children who had been through so much, so little of it they could understand? In the season after such fear, how could these children feel loved and have access to the care they needed? How could the church help them blossom and flourish—how could they, in the words of Lamentations, rise up anew?

With the support of Week of Compassion; gifts and volunteers from both congregations; and the expertise of Children's Disaster Services (a Week of Compassion partner), a medical team at Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville, and Child Life Disaster Services (a local network of specialists with expertise in trauma, positive coping, and resilience), the Sunny Day Camp was born.

Children spent an entire day, at no cost to their families, going about perfectly typical day camp fare at the Western Kentucky 4-H Camp: canoeing, crafts, swimming, meals and snacks. And alongside these gifts of normalcy, trained professionals provided age-appropriate opportunities for processing grief and trauma. Children connected with therapy animals, worked with disaster relief counselors, and had a local physician available for care onsite.

A living witness to God's constant mercies, and committed to healing and wholeness especially among the youngest and most vulnerable, these churches and their local partners put your Week of Compassion gifts to work, transforming suffering into hope, so that churches, communities, and children can rise up anew, together.



Our hope is rooted and nourished by God's steadfast, abundant, enduring, ever-in-supply and in season compassion. Remembering the compassion of God can ease the pain of what seems like a neverending news cycle of devastation.

Yet it is because I remember all this that I have hope. YHWH's favor is not exhausted, nor has God's compassion failed. They rise up anew each morning, so great is God's faithfulness. (Lamentations 3:21-23, The Inclusive Bible)

Singing this promise can give us the strength of heart to **RISE UP ANEW** when our hearts are weary from the work of caring about and for all those in need in this beautiful and broken world.

When rains come and waters rise, generosity follows close behind.

When fires rage and destruction looms, support and help are stirred up too.

When war and disease and drought are too close for too long, compassion comes closer, and God's mercies are made known through the gifts of God's people.

Through domestic disaster response in familiar communities; preparedness training



for congregations and individuals; refugee response in the aftermath of national conflicts; and ecumenical partnerships that engage international disaster response and support basic human needs for shelter, food, education, and livelihoods Week of Compassion proclaims this truth: God's mercies **RISE UP ANEW** each day.

Because of your generosity, Week of Compassion meets people and communities in the midst of grief and lament, in the deepest moments of 'How could this happen?', as the very real presence of God's unfailing compassion.
